

Technical Bulletin

AutoReceive 4.0

Issued: 10/8/07

Summary: General release of AutoReceive 4.0 is scheduled for 10/9/07. Since the end of August, this release has been installed in several hundred physician offices to date, in keeping with the phased implementation plan.

Changes in this release:

- Moved to a new auto-update service.
- Added support for running as a Windows service.
- Added support for running on Windows Vista.*
- Removed support for installing or running on Windows NT, Windows 98, and Windows Me.
- Added the ability to specify username and password for proxy server.
- Added support for enhanced file naming (for HL7/PDF file matching).
- Added feature for end-user to switch between Service Mode and Classic Mode

New terms with Auto Receive 4.0:

- **Service Mode:** AutoReceive is running as a Windows Service. Running as a Windows Service means the PC where AutoReceive is installed only needs to be powered on for AutoReceive to print results.
- **Classic Mode:** AutoReceive is running as it did in prior versions, requiring the PC to be powered on and the user to be logged in.

How the upgrade will occur:

AutoReceive installations programmatically check for updates over the course of each seven day period. AutoReceive will also upgrade to the current release if the PC is restarted or the end user enables "Check for Update Now".

Update

AutoReceive 4.0 will be placed on the update server as well as the Care360 Resource Center starting tomorrow. You should have your Installers or Sales Rep update any USB drives with version 4.0

Firewalls

Some individual Physician firewalls can block AutoReceive from running as a Windows Service. The Client can either run AutoReceive in Classic Mode or add AutoReceive as an allowed application to enable it to run in Service Mode.

**AutoReceive is currently supported on Vista, but in Class Mode only.*
